#### IMPORTANT NOTES

(To be read by the candidate before completing pages 1 and 2)

- 1. Copies of the Regulations for 1954 may be obtained from The Secretary of Local 6. You must record your entries in subjects at Ordinary Level on page 2 of this (Stamps, coins, or notes cannot be accepted. Cheques should be made payable to the the right-hand column. Secretary of Local Examinations, Oxford.)
- 2. This Entry Form, E/Ord, must be used only if you are entering for Ordinary Level subjects only. If you are entering for any subject at Advanced or Scholarship Level you must use Entry Form E/Adv, printed on buff paper. You must complete one entry form only. If for any reason you have to arrange to take certain papers at a centre other than that at which you have entered, a note explaining the facts must be attached to your entry form.
- 3. You must complete this form and hand it to the Local Secretary of your centre, with any fee payable by you, not later than 1 April 1954. If you make any correction to your entry form, you must initial the correction. If you do not enter by 1 April 1954, you must follow the procedure for late entries laid down in § 10 on page 8 of the list overleaf. the Regulations, in which place will also be found the rules about alterations of 10. Apart from the restrictions in 7, 8, and 9 above, you may enter for as many entry, withdrawals, and transfer to another centre.
- 4. The results of candidates who enter the name of their school at 6 on page 1 will 11. In certain subjects (Music, Domestic Subjects, and Modern Languages) special be sent to the Head of the school and not to the candidate individually.
- 5. You should keep a record of your entries by underlining in the list overleaf, and in the time-table below, the papers which you have to take in the subjects for which you have entered.

  - 7. Conditions attach to entry for certain subjects. Notes about these are written against them on page 2 of this form and in the list overleaf.
  - 8. You may not take papers set at overlapping times in the time-table unless permission has previously been obtained from the Delegates for you to do so.
  - 9. Before entering at a centre for any subject which includes a practical test requiring the use of a workshop, or of a laboratory, or of a piano, or of a typewriter, you must satisfy yourself that adequate accommodation and equipment are available at that centre and must ascertain from the Local Secretary of the Centre what fee is payable for their use. The Delegates do not accept any responsibility for the adequacy of the accommodation or of the equipment. The subjects concerned are noted in
  - subjects as is desired.
  - entry forms also must be sent to Oxford. Attention is called to these in the appropriate places on page 2.
  - 12. The time-table printed below is the final time-table. It differs in some respects from the time-table published in the Regulations for 1954.
